Spreading Holiday Cheer

Western Cooperative Electric to retire \$1.2 million in capital credits

As we step into the holiday season, there's a special kind of excitement in the air, and at Western Cooperative Electric, we're thrilled to share some holiday cheer with our

members. We're pleased to announce the retirement of \$1.2 million in capital credits this month. Just in time for Christmas, our members who were connected in 2006, 2007, 2012 and/or 2022 will be receiving a check or bill credit as a symbol of our appreciation and our commitment to the cooperative principles that set us apart.

Much like the season of giving, capital credits are a unique benefit

that cooperatives like Western offer to their members. At the end of each year, operating margins over and above our expenses are allocated back to you, our members. These margins represent your ownership in the cooperative, and each year, the board of trustees carefully reviews our financial position to determine how much we can return to members through capital credits.

Think of it as a little extra something under the tree — though, in this case, it won't need wrapping paper or a bow. These funds come from previous years' margins, and we're thrilled to be in a position to return them to you now. By staying committed to your cooperative, you're helping to keep the lights on for everyone in our community, quite literally spreading warmth and light during these colder months.

Former Ellsworth Athletes Launch Project to **Update Medical Bags for Local Sports and Community Safety**

In a significant push to enhance safety in local sports, former studentathletes MAKENNA HAAS and MADALYN DOBRINKSI launched an initiative to upgrade the medical bags for Ellsworth Junior/Senior High School's Athletics program and the community's recreational activities. "Currently, the existing supplies are unorganized and insufficient, housed in basic book bags," said Haas. "The new, professionally organized medical bags will include essential items such as athletic tape, pre-wrap, medical gloves, sprays and creams for cuts and stings,

gauze pads, ice packs, and essential medications like ibuprofen and Tylenol."

This project began in 2023 during their senior year and is backed by a deep understanding of the community's needs. The project will place three strategically located medical bags at City Hall and the Recreation Center while equipping each of the 18 school athletic teams with their own, fully stocked bags. The initiative will bring a total of 21 new medical bags across the community.

Western Cooperative Electric presented Dobrinksi and Haas with a \$5,000 grant from our Sharing Success fund to support the project.

"This effort will ensure that athletes and community members have timely access to first aid, enhancing safety during sports and community activities," said Nolan Numrich, assistant general manager at Western Cooperative Electric. "By providing our athletes and community members with accessible, quality first-aid resources, Makenna and Madalyn are setting a standard of care and safety that resonates with all of us. Western Cooperative fully supports their initiative and the impact it will have on the entire community."

Mrs. Karl Dawn Stover and Mrs. Connie Weber,

along with Haas and Dobrinksi, will stock the bags and manage the initial distribution. The ongoing resupply efforts will be coordinated by Athletic Director Ron Davis, to ensure each sport's specific needs are met.

"This initiative speaks to the strength of our young leaders and their commitment to community well-being," said Stover, who will help lead the team in assembling the bags. "These medical kits will provide peace of mind, knowing that immediate assistance is within reach for both organized sports and community activities. Makenna and Madalyn's dedication will have a lasting impact on safety and preparedness."

The organizers aim to have these medical bags operational by the end of the 2024-2025

"Our community deserves the peace of mind that comes with knowing that up-to-date and accessible first aid supplies are available, not just for our athletes but for all participants in community activities," stated Haas and Dobrinksi. "This initiative represents a crucial step in our commitment to the health and safety of our community members."

- 2. The co-op pays operating expenses throughout the year and allocates any leftover operating revenue as capital credits.
- **3.** When financial conditions permit, the co-op board votes to retire (pay) capital credits to the members.





4. We send members their share of capital credits as a bill credit or check.
