## Hang Your Sockets with Care

Cherished family memories often involve the twinkling lights of the tree and decorations inside and outside the home.

Western Cooperative Electric offers these decorating tips for keeping your holidays safe and bright:

- Look for signs of wear on cords, sockets and plugs. Verify bulbs are not broken and wires are not cracked or frayed. Repair or replace any damaged items.
- Make sure all holiday lights have been tested by a certified laboratory and labeled with a quality marker, such as "UL."
- Don't place cords over points of entry or exit to prevent tripping hazards and damage to cords.
- Use a step stool or ladder if you need to reach overhead. Use one with a stud base and place it on a stable surface. Always climb facing toward the rungs.
- Don't pierce the cords, if you are using nails or tacks to hang lights, rather rest the cords on them or use plastic clips instead.

- Be aware of overhead power lines, when decorating outside, including the service connection to your home.
- Use only heavy-duty extension cords designated for outdoor use when decorating outside.
- ► Keep live trees from drying out. Use a sturdy stand and refill the water at least once a day. Keep your tree away from heat sources, especially fireplaces and space heaters, as well as curtains. Know the location of your fire extinguisher. Although artificial trees are less flammable, purchase a flame-resistant model.
- Make sure your lights are turned off when leaving the house. Keeping your lights on continually presents the risk of lights shorting out and resulting in an electrical fire.

# **Space Heaters Safety Tips**

Space heaters can be a quick way to heat up a room. However, they can be as dangerous as they are convenient if used improperly. Space heaters cause numerous home fires a year, and many emergency room visits.

Approximately one-third of all house fires nationwide happen during the cold home heating months between December and February. Equipment intended to add a little extra warmth, such as space heaters, is the leading cause of these fires.

Western offers the following precautions when using electric space heaters:

- Purchase only space heaters that have been safety tested and UL approved. Make sure the unit is equipped with an emergency tipover shut-off feature and heating element guards. Read and follow all the manufacturer's instructions for operation and care.
- Make sure your smoke and carbon monoxide detectors are in good working condition before using a space heater,
- Make sure the heater is clean and in good condition, and have all problems professionally repaired.
- Place heater out of high-traffic areas and on a level, hard, non-flammable floor surface—NOT on carpets,

furniture or countertops.

- Space heaters have one purpose to provide supplemental heating.
  Never use them to thaw pipes, cook food, or dry clothing or towels.
- Remember to keep space heaters at least three feet from combustible liquids like fuel, spray cans and paint, as well as flammable items such as draperies, blankets and sofas.
- Never allow pets or children near an electric heater. Accidental contact could result in serious shock or burns.
- Don't overload circuits. Never use extension cords or multiple plugs with a space heater, and make sure the unit is not plugged into the same circuit as other electric appliances.
- If your space heater is plugged into a ground fault circuit interrupter (GFCI) and it trips, don't assume there is something wrong with the GFCI. Immediately stop using the heater until it can be checked by a professional—if not, a serious shock could occur.
- Never leave space heaters unattended. Turn off your space heater and unplug it before leaving the room or going to bed.
- Replace older space heaters with newer, safer models.
